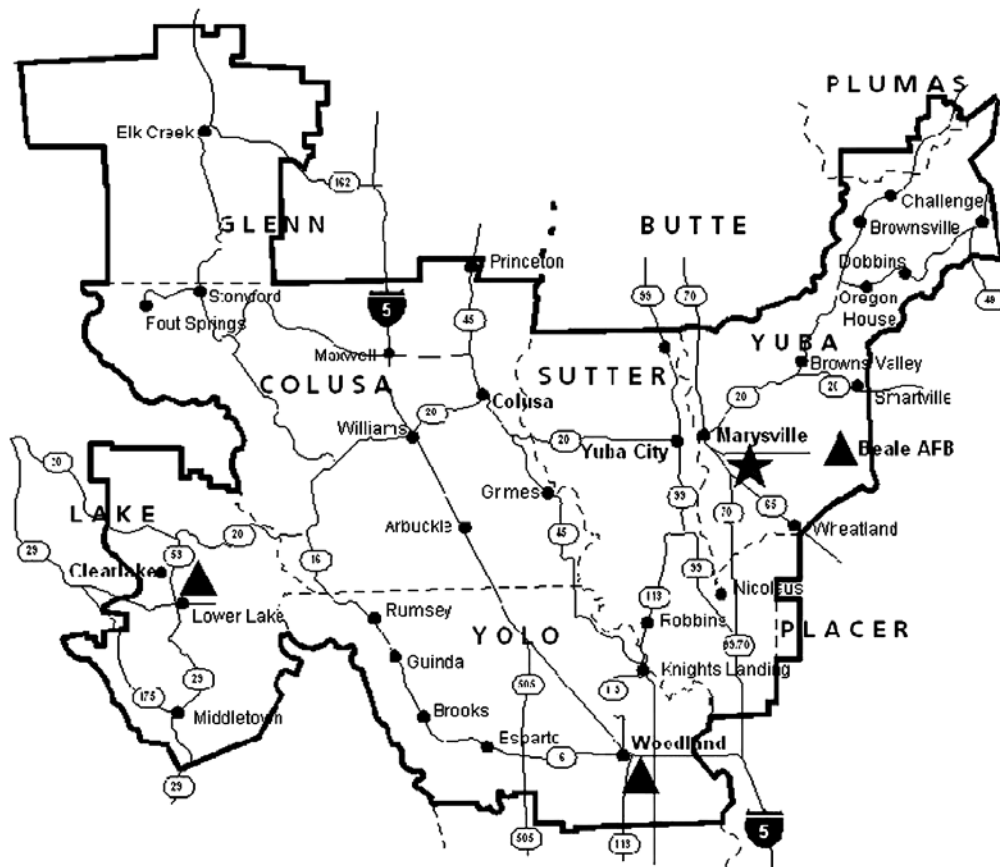

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Message from the Chief of Police

Yuba Community College District Police Department Values:

Yuba Community College District Police Department is committed to being a leader in supporting the district's vision statement and mission statement by providing quality services, community orienting policing to prepare its students to meet the intellectual, occupational and technological challenges of a complex world.

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Background Information:

The Yuba Community College District Police Department (YCCDPD) has a dedicated full-service police department with a Chief of Police, 6 full-time sworn police officers and 4 part-time sworn police officers, one full-time civilian personnel and student employees. YCCDPD has primary law enforcement jurisdiction on the campus and associated College properties. The department is empowered as a full-service state law enforcement agency pursuant to section 830.32 of the California Penal Code and fully subscribes to the standards of the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST). Officers receive the same basic training as city and county peace officers throughout the state, plus additional training to meet the unique needs of the campus environment.

The department handles all patrol, investigation, crime prevention, emergency preparedness and related law enforcement duties for the campus community.

Summary of the 2009-2010 Final YCCDPD Budget

For the 2009-2010 Budget Year began with zero funding. The YCCDPD is required to justify the funding of all personnel, services, etc. that was an expense for the year's budget.

Approximately 80% of the overall budget is consumed in personnel costs, which are fixed through the bargaining process. The YCCDPD annual budget increased by only 1% each year for the past 5 years. The final 2009-2010 budget as presented and provided an ending fund balance with additional revenue of approximately \$18,000.00. The additional revenue was absorbed into the district's general fund.

The Jeanne Clery Act

The Jeanne Clery Act requires the compilation and disclosure of Campus Crime Statistics, disclosure of Campus Safety Policies, Timely Warning requirements and disclosure of Crime Log Information. Further The Jeanne Clery Act mandates the collection of information regarding incidents from non-law enforcement "campus security authorities" having "significant responsibility for student or campus activities."

The Yuba Community College District Police Department (YCCDPD) has the responsibility for gathering statistics, identifying reportable crimes and reporting/publishing statistics to the Department of Education, the FBI, and to the public. Statistics are reported in different formats and categories depending upon legal requirements: FBI reports include different crimes from The Jeanne Clery Act, while The Jeanne Clery Act requires statistics to be reported from a wider geographic area than the FBI (e.g., adjacent public property), and also requires reports of student disciplinary referrals in addition to arrests for drug, alcohol, and weapons offenses.

In compliance with The Jeanne Clery Act, the Yuba Community College District Police Department has produced this handbook. Also the Department of Education Office of Post Secondary Education. Statistics are available on-line at: <http://ope.ed.gov/security/>. Production of the Crime Statistics and Campus Safety Information handbook begins in January with the collection of crime statistics and development of a design.

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The information/statistics compiled for the Campus Security Report is for the previous calendar year based upon crime reports received by the Yuba Community College District Police Department; from crime statistics received from outside agencies; and from incident reports received from other "Campus Security Authorities."

Alcohol and College Students

College students spend approximately \$42 million yearly on alcohol, more than it costs to operate campus libraries and fund all scholarships and fellowships nationwide. Although often viewed as a "social lubricant," alcohol can quickly deteriorate social relations. Alcohol also has other consequences, including: increased risk of accidents, homicide, suicide, physical injury, sexual assault and psychological and behavioral problems. This is in addition to the legal, health and academic risks of abuse. These same risks hold true for alcohol or drug-impaired faculty and staff. If you decide to drink, some of the following tips may help prevent problems:

- Remember, the legal drinking age is 21. Underage drinking puts you at risk for sanctions.
- Set your own alcohol limit and stick to it. Pace your drinking.
- Designate a nondrinker in your group. This person can watch out for potential problems, including excessive drinking.
- Don't leave your group of friends, and don't put yourself at risk by leaving with a new acquaintance.
- Monitor your drink at all times. Do not drink "punches" or other drinks that you did not see made. Discard your drink if it has been left unattended for any length of time.
- Consider your use patterns.

Getting a Person to Seek Help

Alcohol/Drug abuse is often characterized by denial: here are a few hints for getting the message across:

- Talk with the person when they are sober.
- Give facts, not lectures.
- Do not make or accept excuses for drug affected behavior.
- Identify benefits of seeking help, and the consequences of not seeking help.
- Show honest concern and patience.
- Be prepared with information and referrals.
- Seek assistance in helping this person.
- Do not rescue; let the person clear up his/her own mistakes and assume responsibility for his/her drinking using behavior.

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Laws and Campus Policies

Campus policy and state law forbid unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of alcoholic beverages or controlled substances by employees and students in the workplace, on College premises, at official College functions or on College business. Specific restrictions can be found in the following sources:

2. The Federal Drug Free Workplace Act of 1988 (Public Law 100-690, Title V, Sub D)

5. The Controlled Substances Act, 21 United States Code 812, and by regulations at 21, Code of Federal Regulations 1308.
6. Business and Professions Code Section 25608, Possession of any alcoholic beverage while on school grounds.

Sexual Assault & Rape - Student Procedures

AP 3540 – Sexual Assaults on Campus

Reference: Education Code Section 67385; the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act; 34 C.F.R. § 668.46(b)(11)

Sexual assault prevention, education, policy, and procedures are governed by the Yuba Community College District Campus Student Policy and Procedures Regarding Rape and Sexual Assault. This policy describes in detail prevention and education programs around the topic of sexual assault, as well as procedures for dealing with incidents after they have occurred. Any sexual assault or physical abuse, including, but not limited to, rape, as defined by California law, whether committed by an employee, student, or member of the public, occurring on District property, or on an off-campus site or facility maintained by the District, or on grounds or facilities maintained by a student organization, is a violation of District policies and regulations, and is subject to all applicable punishment, including criminal procedures and employee or student discipline procedures. (See also, AP 5500, Standards of Student Conduct.)

"Sexual assault" includes but is not limited to, rape, forced sodomy, forced oral copulation, rape by a foreign object, sexual battery, or threat of sexual assault. All students, faculty members, or staff members who allege they are the victims of a sexual assault on District property shall be provided with information regarding options and assistance available to them. Information shall be available from the District Police Department, which shall maintain the identity and other information about alleged sexual assault victims as confidential unless and until the District Police Department is authorized to release such information.

Yuba Community College District is committed to creating and maintaining an environment in which all persons who participate in College programs and activities can work together in an atmosphere free of all forms of harassment, exploitation, or intimidation. Yuba Community College District will take appropriate action to prevent, correct, and discipline behavior that is

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found to violate campus policy or regulations proscribing rape or sexual assault (hereafter in referred to as sexual assault).

Campus Prevention & Education Efforts

Yuba Community College District employs a multifaceted approach to preventing sexual assault. The campus maintains the Student Health Services located in Building 100B on the Yuba College. These groups collaborate to distribute the Procedures Regarding Rape and Sexual Assault; to provide educational workshops to campus faculty, staff, and students; and to develop and disseminate educational materials relating to the prevention of sexual assault.

Campus Procedures for Responding to Sexual Assault

This section outlines the procedures the campus follows in responding to reports of sexual assault allegedly committed by students. It assumes that the incident occurred on or near campus (at an official College function or on College property). However, many of the procedures and services described here also apply if the incident happened off-campus or if the individual reporting the assault is not a student.

When an incident is reported to any unit providing sexual assault resources on campus, the person to whom the report is made shall inform the student of her or his option to notify local law enforcement authorities, including the Yuba Community College District Police Department. The student shall also be informed of the importance of preserving evidence required for proof of possible criminal activity, and of the availability of the institutional personnel to assist the student in notifying the authorities of the incident, upon the student's request. Finally, the student shall also be informed of the existing on and off campus counseling, mental health, and other student services as outlined below.

The campus provides confidential and trained assistance to individuals reporting a sexual assault. Primary assistance is given through Student Health Services. Student Health Services offers both immediate and ongoing response to students, including confidential crisis counseling, assistance and advocacy with the initial medical evaluation, and academic and housing issues. Health Services also provides general medical care for students who report being sexually assaulted. Other services include treatment for injuries, testing for pregnancy, sexually transmitted disease, and HIV. However, the YCCD does not provide medical evidence collection. For this procedure, the patient would be referred to a community emergency room.

Off-campus resources include local physicians, hospitals such as Rideout Hospital (Marysville), and local law enforcement authorities, such as the Yuba County Sheriff's Department, Woodland Police Department and Clear Lake Police Department.

If the student is willing to report the incident to the Yuba Community College District Police Department, she or he is informed that medical evidence can be collected at the same time as medical care is provided. However, without a police report, medical evidence for a criminal prosecution cannot be collected. Under these circumstances, the student is informed that the state will bear the cost of the medical exam and is instructed not to bathe, shower, or douche so that important medical evidence can be preserved.

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Although the student is not required to notify any law enforcement authority regarding the incident, the person to whom the report is made shall contact the Yuba Community College District Police Department to inform them that a sexual assault may have occurred. The Police Department in turn shall notify the Title IX Compliance Officer, who is responsible for coordinating the campus's response to the incident. Licensed mental health workers, who learn about sexual assault as part of their professional roles, are not required to violate confidentiality. Anonymous summary statistical information will be reported.

After YCCDPD is contacted, a uniformed officer will be dispatched to take the report. The local law enforcement jurisdiction will be notified by the YCCDPD. With the consent of the student, a full police report will be taken by a police officer who accompanies the student to the hospital. At the request of the student, a friend, family member, or other designated person may be present. The officer will advise the student regarding hospital procedures and the availability of assistance through College Health Services. The YCCDPD will assist the local law enforcement jurisdiction with the investigation and YCCDPD will explain the legal process to the student. The completed investigation shall present a completed written investigation to the district attorney's office for review and filing of criminal charges.

If the student is unwilling to report the matter to the police or to be transported to the hospital by the police, she or he is then urged to seek assistance immediately from Student Health Services for coordination of medical care, counseling, and other available support alternatives. The student may request changes in her or his academic or living situation or in that of an alleged assailant, after the student has made a report of an assault, and the campus shall grant any reasonable request for such change.

When a student reports being sexually assaulted by another student, the Student Services Office, at the direction of the Title IX Compliance Officer, shall conduct a timely investigation of the allegations in the case and interview any witnesses as needed. The determination of whether to proceed with charges in a sexual assault case is the joint decision of the Student Services Office and the Title IX Compliance Officer, in consultation as needed with the Police Department, with final authority residing with the Title IX Compliance Officer. When formal charges are brought against the accused student by the College, the case shall either go to a hearing for adjudication or an administrative disposition settlement agreement shall be negotiated.

The individual charged with sexual assault is entitled to due process and will be given notice and a full opportunity to respond to the allegation made against her or him. The individual can seek representation, may have the same opportunity as the student who reported being assaulted to have a non-participating observer present during the proceedings, and is entitled to information about the campus policy on rape and sexual assault and the procedures that will be followed. If the Vice-President of Student Services imposes disciplinary sanctions, the student who reports being sexually assaulted is informed of the outcome, and the charged student may appeal the action as set forth in the Campus Code of Student Conduct.

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When a student who reports being sexually assaulted files charges with the Yuba Community College District Police Department, the criminal investigation and the campus judicial investigation are coordinated but independently conducted, occurring simultaneously or sequentially, on a case-by-case basis.

Rules, Regulations & Policies

Yuba Community College District students come from a variety of places all over the state — and the world — where laws and other regulations vary. While in California, and on the Yuba Community College District Campuses specifically, you are required to obey all applicable laws, including state, federal, and municipal codes. As a Yuba Community College District student, you are also required to adhere to campus codes, rules, and regulations. We hope you will help contribute to the safety of the campuses by following these guidelines. Rules of Conduct in Campus Buildings

The buildings on the Yuba Community College District campuses are for appropriate use and enjoyment by students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The following policies have been established to promote the safety and security of all occupants and visitors:

- Follow all posted building rules restricting use or access.
- Duplicating or distributing keys or card keys without authorization is a violation of the Campus Access Control Policy, and is punishable under section 469 of the California Penal Code.
- Assisting unauthorized access to buildings or propping open exterior doors, against building security policies, is a violation of the Campus Access Control Policy.
- Lodging overnight, except in residential facilities or for academic purposes, is prohibited.
- Adhere to all campus fire safety rules, including prompt, orderly evacuation in case of alarm.
- Intentionally initiating a false fire alarm is a violation of California Penal Code Section 148.4a punishable by a 1,000 fine or a one-year jail sentence
- Disrupting classroom, administrative, or other College-sponsored or approved activities can result in arrest by YCCDPD, enforcement by the Office of Student Services, and/or expulsion from the campus.
- Smoking in buildings (except for private residences) is prohibited by campus policy and State law. When smoking outside, keep enough distance to ensure that tobacco smoke does not enter buildings. On January 1, 2004, a new law affecting public buildings went into effect. Sections 7596-7598 of the Government Code prohibits smoking within 20 feet of main entrances, exits, and operable windows of any building owned, leased, and occupied by the California community colleges. Use of tobacco products on the Woodland campus is prohibited.
- Riding mopeds, bicycles, skateboards, roller blades, or skates is prohibited in buildings or on walkways where hazards could be created by their use. In accordance with the fire marshal policy, vehicles may not be stored in any public spaces, hallways, corridors, or stairwells, or attached to railings. Bicycles may be stored in non-public space sanctioned, or authorized, in buildings by departments or building coordinators/ managers.

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- Animals (except laboratory animals) or those assisting disabled persons, or as otherwise authorized by departments or building coordinators/managers are not to be brought into buildings
- Use of campus or departmental bulletin boards must be authorized by the department, or by the building coordinator/manager.
- Tampering, misuse, abuse, or destruction of emergency equipment or other College property is a violation of Penal Code Sections 148.4 and 594(b).

Disciplinary Action

Office of Student Services (530) 741-6707

Responsibility for pursuing campus disciplinary actions involving students rests with the Office of Student Services, which reports to the President. The office is also responsible for notifying the Yuba Community College District Police Department and Title IX Compliance Officer of any allegations of sexual assault. At the direction of the Title IX Compliance Officer, the Office of Student Services will conduct an investigation of the allegations in the case and interview any witnesses. The campus has jurisdiction over offenses by students that occur on College property such as classrooms, in other locations in the immediate vicinity of the campus, during official College functions, and off campus.

Pending a formal disciplinary hearing, the campus may take a variety of administrative measures against a charged student, including restriction of privileges and services, interim suspension, and exclusion from certain campus areas, such as classrooms.

To prevent further conflict between the parties, the campus may use administrative reassignment procedures to limit access to a specific hall or complex during the course of a campus or criminal investigation, or make academic accommodations as appropriate for either party. Normal student conduct procedures will be followed in resolving allegations of sexual misconduct, with the following exception: a hearing in a case concerning allegations of sexual misconduct may be closed to the public if the hearing body determines that the privacy rights of a witness, including those of the individual who reports being assaulted, may otherwise be jeopardized.

Disciplinary actions that may be imposed from the Student Services process may include but are not limited to: written warning, disciplinary probation, loss of privileges and exclusion from activities, exclusion from areas of the campus, restitution, College service, monetary fines, records hold, suspension, dismissal, deferral or withholding of degree, revocation of degree previously conferred, stay of sanction, or other actions.

Safety Services & Programs

Services

Sex Offender Registration Requirements & Information—Megan’s Law

The State of California requires sex offenders to register with the police in the jurisdiction in which they reside. The State makes this information available to law enforcement agencies. The information is available to the public at the local police department. New state law (October, 2002) also requires sex offenders to register with YCCDPD if they are working at the college (including contractors) or attend classes. The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act FERPA) was also amended to make it clear that FERPA does not prohibit release of data on registered sex offenders under this law.

Megan’s Law allows the public to view information about “Serious” and “High Risk” sexual offenders that may be residing in their community. This enables the public to be aware of potential risks in their community. The public can then make informed decisions when taking safety precautions to protect themselves and their children from sex offenders. Campus Patrols

The Yuba Community College District Police Department uses uniformed and non-uniformed officers to patrol the campuses in cars, on bicycles and on foot patrol. These patrols are conducted on the roadways and walkways of the campus, as well as in buildings.

Lighting/Telephones

Yuba Community College District has pay telephones located throughout the Marysville campus and Woodland campus.

Safety Escort Service

- **Marysville Campus:** If you feel fearful walking on campus you may request a safety escort by dialing extension 6771 from any campus phone or (530) 741-6771 from other phones. If you are calling after business hours you may call the Campus Police cellular phone at (530) 870-1158. Provide the YCCDPD Officer with your current location and intended destination. If there are special circumstances or risks that you know about, be sure to share them with the officer. Subject to availability, an officer will be dispatched to your location to walk with you to your destination. An officer may wish to transport you in a vehicle if it is more practical based on conditions.
- **Woodland Campus:** For safety escorts and other Courtesy service, call (530) 681-8782. (It is a call-forward number to the duty cell phone.)

Vehicle Jumpstart Courtesy Service

The YCCDPD police vehicles are equipped with battery jumpstart systems to allow officers to attempt to assist motorists who have discharged batteries. This service is provided at no charge, subject to officer availability and is performed only if the vehicle owner. Normally there is very little risk, however officers are not trained mechanics and from time to time damage occurs.

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Persons who have insurance coverage for jumpstart service or who do not want to accept the risk of damage should call a professional mechanic.

Programs

Police Cadet Programs

The Police Cadet Program employs a diverse group of Yuba Community College District students. Its mission is to provide outreach to the campus community, while helping to deter crime on the campus and parking enforcement. Police Cadets provide high visibility, uniformed patrol of the campus. This includes, but is not limited to, the campus, buildings and parking lots. They act as additional “eyes and ears” to the police department.

Emergency Preparedness

Earthquakes:

When an earthquake occurs: DUCK. COVER AND HOLD where you are! If you cannot get under a sturdy object, crouch down next to a wall and protect your head and neck with your arms. Avoid windows, bookcases and heavy objects that could fall. Stay under cover until the shaking stops, and then evacuate the building. Watch out for flying glass and falling plaster, light fixtures, bricks and other debris. Once outside, move to an open area, away from trees, buildings, electrical poles, and wires.

Bomb Threat:

If YCCDPD orders an evacuation, take personal belongings when you leave. Leave doors and windows open; do not turn light switches on or off. Check work area for unfamiliar items if time permits. Do not touch suspicious items; report them to campus authorities. If you receive a bomb threat, dial Marysville campus (530) 741-6771 or 870-1158 after 4:30 p.m. Woodland campus (530) 681-8782, to reach YCCDPD.

Fire Safety:

Take fire alarms seriously and evacuate quickly and calmly! Touch closed doors, and do not try to open them if they are hot. Do not use elevators—take the stairs. Move away from fire and smoke. Close doors and windows if time permits. Pull an alarm as you leave the building, if one has not already been pulled. Call Marysville campus (530) 741-6771 or 870-1158 after 4:30 p.m. Woodland campus (530) 681-8782 from any campus phone at a safe location.

Fire safety is everyone’s responsibility. If you live in a rental unit or apartment, do not assume your safety is the landlord’s chief concern. Know how to escape a fire successfully and evaluate your home for basic fire safety.

Hazardous Materials:

Move away from the site of the hazard to a safe location. Call Marysville campus (530) 741-6771 or 870-1158 after 4:30 p.m. Woodland campus (530) 681-8782. Follow the directions of professional emergency workers.

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In All Major Emergencies:

Use stairs only; do not use elevators. Be aware of the needs of people with disabilities and learn how to offer assistance. If you are disabled, make a plan in advance that includes how you will direct any volunteer rescue attempt on your behalf. Know where you can shelter safely in buildings where you spend a lot of time.

Before an Emergency:

Learn the evacuation routes, and participate in evacuation drills in your home and other buildings you use frequently.

Make Your Home Office Safer:

Remove heavy objects from top shelves or above where you sit or sleep. Have tall bookcases and file cabinets bolted to the wall. Secure computers to desktops, and restrain books on shelves. Make sure objects will not tip over and block your exit. Check battery-operated smoke detectors monthly, and replace batteries annually. Learn where fire extinguishers are located, and learn how to use them (a good, general purpose extinguisher is the 5lb., A-B-C type). Do not overload electrical outlets, and keep hallways clear and free of debris.

Put Together Emergency Kits for Your Home, Car and Office:

Include: flashlight and spare batteries, food and water (for three days), three-day supply of prescription medicines, extra prescription glasses, contact lenses and solution, first aid kit, battery-powered AM/FM radio (and extra batteries), durable/comfortable shoes, blankets or coats, leather work gloves, a whistle, money and out-of-state emergency contact numbers.

WHEREAS, On July 15, 2009, Officer Green was the first officer on the scene of a reported physical fight in progress with one subject being stabbed on Linda Avenue, Yuba County; and

WHEREAS, Officer Green encountered 15 to 20 citizens (adults and children) standing in the field and observed a white male subject lying in the field with lacerations. Officer Green was able to administer first aid and secure a witness, who witnessed the fight and stabbing for the Yuba County Sheriff's Department. Officer Green's quick response, training and experience enabled him to react quickly and secure the witness which was a contributing factor in the subsequent arrest of the suspect; and

WHEREAS, On October 30, 2008, Officer Green was informed by Yuba County Sheriff Deputy regarding a possible wanted vehicle on the Yuba College campus used by the suspect(s) in a home invasion robbery; and

WHEREAS, Officer Green and a Yuba County Deputy Sheriff located the unoccupied parked vehicle in front of Building 100B. Officer Green observed a pump action shotgun in plain view on the floorboard of the vehicle. The suspect was subsequently arrested and charged with possession of the loaded shotgun with a shell in the chamber and another live shotgun shell in the magazine; and

WHEREAS, On December 22, 2008, Officer Green received a "THANK YOU" letter from Wallace Fullerton, Chief of Police, City of Marysville for his assistance in the capture and arrest of a kidnapping suspect, whom MPD was seeking to locate; and

WHEREAS, Officer Green initially observed the suspect and victim in the parking lot of the College Administrative Building and immediately perceived that something was wrong. Officer Green's swift actions and correct perception of the seriousness of the matter was instrumental in the suspect's capture; and

WHEREAS, Officer Green is active with the Yuba Community College District Police Academy as a Scenario Evaluator for the Basic Academy; and **WHEREAS**, We are proud that he is part of the Yuba Community College Police Department family.

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Documented Reported Crimes Within the District

Note: The listed summary does not encompass all of the reported crimes for 2009. The summary is a snapshot of some of the reported crimes and/or incidents within the Yuba Community College District.

Report # 09-0011 Disturbance

On January 23, 2009, a YCCDPD officer responded to a disturbance in the testing center. A subject began yelling and accusing a YCCD employee of being a racist. The subject violated District Policy regarding testing materials. The student left on his own accord.

Report #09-0012 – Wrong way driving/Driving without a license

On January 29, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer observed a vehicle driving the wrong way on a one way street. After being stopped the driver of the vehicle also did not have a valid driver's license. The subject was issued a misdemeanor citation for driving without a valid driver's license and a traffic citation for wrong way driving.

Report #09-0016 – Possession of marijuana and paraphernalia

On February 5, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer responded to a report of a vehicle illegally parked. The Officer observed that the occupants of the vehicle were acting suspiciously and subsequently searched the vehicle. While searching the vehicle the Officer located a small amount of marijuana and a glass methamphetamine pipe in the vehicle. One of the occupants of the vehicle was arrested for possession of marijuana and possession paraphernalia.

Reports #09-0024 – Vehicle Hit and run

On February 12, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer responded to a report of a vehicle hit and run. The Officer subsequently located the suspect vehicle and the driver was issued a misdemeanor citation for hit and run.

Report #09-0029 – Possession of marijuana

On February 19, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer responded to a report of a male and female in a verbal argument. After further investigation and a search of the males backpack, the officer located a small amount of marijuana in the subject's backpack. The subject was issued a misdemeanor citation for possession of marijuana.

Report #09-0035 – Sexual battery

On February 25, 2009, a female student reported that she had been sexual assaulted in the West parking lot. After the YCCDPD Officer completed an initial investigation all information was forwarded to Yuba County Sheriff Department Detectives for further investigation.

Report #09-0036 – Medical Aide

On February 26, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer responded to the report of a male subject having a seizure. Officers responded to several more seizure calls over the next several days for the male subject. All calls were handled appropriately and without incident.

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Report #09-0045 – A Reported Fire

On March 11, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer received a report of electrical wires smoking and fire in Building 1200 (Gym). Yuba County Sheriff's Department Dispatch was notified and the officer drove to the scene of the fire. An electric motor on the basketball goal had malfunctioned and the motor had caught fire. The building was evacuated and classes were cancelled in the building until the motor could be made safe.

Report #09-0060 – Trespass warning

On April 8, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer responded to the report of a male subject harassing a mentally handicapped female student. The Officer located the male subject and the subject was issued a trespass warning.

Report # 09-0067 Vehicle theft

On April 22, 2009, a student reported their vehicle stolen. The student stated they parked their vehicle while they attend their regularly scheduled class.

Report #09-0068 – Driving without a license

On April 23, 2009, while conducting traffic enforcement a YCCDPD Officer stopped a driver for speeding. Upon further investigation the Officer found that the driver did not have a valid driver's license. The driver was issued a misdemeanor citation for driving without a valid driver's license.

Report #09-0076 Vandalism

On April 29, 2009, a YCCDPD officer responded to a reported vandalism. A YCCD student reported that their vehicle was vandalized while it was parked in the West Parking Lot.

Report #09-0081 – Possession of marijuana

On May 5, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer stopped a subject on a bicycle. After further investigation and subsequent search of the subject the Officer located a small amount of marijuana on the subject's person. The subject was issued a misdemeanor citation for possession of marijuana.

Report #09-0090 – Medical Aid

On October 27, 2010, a YCCDPD Officer responded to the report of a student having panic attacks. Emergency medical services were contacted and the student was transported to the hospital for treatment.

On July 8, 2009, YCCD student reported a theft to a YCCDPD officer. The student stated report their rear license plate was stolen from their vehicle.

Report #09-0132 Theft

On July 20, 2009, a juvenile student was contacted regarding a theft. The student was observed via YCCD IP video cameras removing sodas from a vending machine at Woodland Community College.

Report #09-0136 – Medical Aide

On, August 12, 2009, a male subject came into the YCCDPD office and reported that he cut his finger. The Officer bandaged the wound and transported the subject to Rideout Hospital for further treatment.

Report #09-0137 – Stolen License Plate

On August 17, 2009, a YCCDPD Officer contacted a victim reference a license plate being stolen from his vehicle in the west parking lot. After interviewing the victim it was determined that the rear license plate to his vehicle had been removed without his knowledge or permission between the hours of 12:40 pm and 4:00 pm by an unknown suspect. A CHP 180 Form was completed and entered into the CLETS system.
